**Cast into the Deep
A Prayer I Hesitate to Pray
Fr. Rolly Astudillo**

Every time I wake up in the morning, I pause for a while to say a personal prayer before joining in the Church's Liturgy of the Hours where we, as clerics, start our day with the Office of Readings followed by Lauds or Morning Prayer until the Vespers (Evening Prayer) and Night Prayers.

As ordained ministers of the Church, we consecrate through our prayers every hour or hours each day in prayer and hence the name: The Liturgy of the Hours where we pray with the psalms and intercede for all. A short form of this four volume Prayer of the Liturgy of the Hours is called the Breviary.

Like every prayer formula, once a person gets into the system of praying the formula, it becomes so easy but outside the formula, it becomes difficult.

People ask me in confession, "Father, did you say my penance is to pray five Hail Mary's?" That's a formula. It's so easy to do. Get out of it. And for your penance, "Pray a personal prayer for those you have recently offended by your sins." That's outside the formula.

The forms of Prayers that we have learned from the "I Confess", the "Act of Contrition", the "Hail Mary" and many others are meant to connect us with everyone in common prayer based on Scripture and the practice of the Church to pray certain prayers that have the same content and substance. Yet personal prayer is a prayer that comes from the innermost of our being as a "cry of anguish", a "prayer of heartfelt gratitude", a "prayer in despair" like Job in the Old Testament or Mary in her Magnificat in the New Testament.

When I was in college seminary, I studied the works of Jacques Maritain and tried to sum up his *Metaphysical Book on "The Degrees of Knowledge."* I loved his works but above all, his spirituality. Because of my interest in him, I continued to look for something that led him to be different from others and I found this prayer which is lovely but when prayed, I do so hesitatingly:

Give me, my God, what you have left, give me what no one asks of you.

I do not ask you for rest or tranquility, neither of soul nor of body.

I do not ask you for wealth or success or even health.

All of that, my God, people ask of you so much that you must not have any more.

Give me, my God what you have left. Give me what others refused from you.

I want insecurity and anxiety. I want storm and strife and that you will give them to me once and for all, my God, so that I will be certain of having them always, since I will not have the courage to ask them of you.

Give me, my God, what you have left. Give me what others do not want. But give me also courage and faith, because you alone, my God, give that which one cannot expect of oneself.

Do I pray this? Yes, I do when I feel so comfortable, thinking that I'm too self-sufficient.

Typically, our prayers are for peace of mind, clarity, security, a straight and well-lit path. It's another way of saying that my prayers are like most prayers, prayers that are invoked to avoid suffering.

Now, this prayer has challenged me to pray differently.

13th Sunday in Ordinary Time**First Reading: 2 Kings 4:8-11, 14-16a****Second Reading: Romans 6:3-4,8-11****Gospel: Matthew 10:37-42**

In an age when people are growing farther apart, there is a greater need for friendliness more than ever before, and the traditional value of hospitality is once more being rediscovered.

We have a beautiful story in the first reading. It's the delightful story of a couple who made the prophet, Elisha, welcome under their roof and as a result, were rewarded with the gift of a son. The wealthy lady saw in Elisha a holy man and treated him with care and respect and the lady was given a prophet's reward: a son in a year.

This is an indication of how hospitality is precious in the eyes of God. God invites us first through baptism so that we can share in the life, death and resurrection of Christ and, therefore, become bearers of the message of God's hospitality as we heard from the second reading. We become alive for God in Christ Jesus.

The gospel reminds us of all the small ways of giving and caring, even a trivial act of kindness like giving a cup of cold water to a stranger on our doorstep, which will win God's favor and result in a great blessing. Fr. Henri Nouwen in his book entitled *Reaching Out*, defined hospitality as: "the creation of a friendly space where a stranger can enter and leave in freedom" and also, providing a comfortable empty space for them. In other words, it is the capability of giving up one's comfort and well-being in order to put oneself in the place of others.

Hospitality is a demanding task as it involves a reshaping of our attitudes. It may mean coming to grips with years of in-built selfishness which goes against the grain.

Before I came to Los Angeles to serve here as a priest, I was in the mining community up in the mountains of Northern Philippines. One time, when I went home to our place in Kiangan, Ifugao Province, I really enjoyed my stay. I visited some of my relatives, smiling at people that I met on the road and occasionally stopping for a short talk or just to say hello. It was really nice to experience the simplicity, friendship, warm welcome and hospitality of people I knew when I was growing up. But what touched me most was when my childhood playmate ran up to me and handed me a bag of mangoes which came from his small farm, for me to bring along on my way back to Lepanto Mines.

The world we live in is crying for small acts of mercy, which cost little but are sadly missing like a smile, a word of appreciation or a phone call. In extending welcome to other people, we are following in the footsteps of the Master who has room for everyone in his heart.

Christ comes to our doors in many disguises and is not always recognizable. There are times when we are reluctant to help our neighbors in need. Perhaps we feel that they do not deserve it. Sometimes it is because we simply do not have the motivation nor the patience to make sacrifices for them. When a stranger comes looking for help, our natural instinct tells us not to get involved nor to trouble ourselves. Unless we have made a conscious decision to reach out to those in want, we will resent the disturbance such intrusions make on our privacy and therefore run the risk of neglecting a genuine needy person.

The artist's model

When John Kennedy was a student at Harvard University in 1939, he vacationed one summer in England.

While there, he visited diplomat John Cooper Wiley and his sculptress wife, Irena Baruch Wiley.

The Polish sculptress was looking for someone to model for an angel she was creating for one of the panels surrounding a life-sized statue of her favorite saint, Therese of Lisieux. The altar had been commissioned for a church in Belgium. The curly haired Kennedy with his youthful serene expression seemed perfect, and he agreed to be her model.

By the time Wiley finished her wood carving, the Nazis occupied Belgium. So the altar was sent to the Vatican for safekeeping where it was later passed on to one of the city's churches. Today the panel shows a winged, curly haired guardian angel hovering over the saint,

The angel is John Kennedy.

SAFEGUARDING THE CHILDREN

Creating boundaries for Mobile Phones

- Contact service provider to block internet access and calls from unapproved phone numbers.
- Designate certain times that cell phone must be turned off (family meals, school hours, after 10 p.m.)
- Insist that parental permission is required for the download of any and all apps.

Creación de límites para el teléfono móvil
