**Tenth Sunday in
Ordinary Time**

**First Reading: Genesis 3:9-15
Second Reading: 2 Corinthians 4:13-5:1
Gospel: Mark 3:20-35**

This is tenth Sunday in ordinary time. In today's gospel, Jesus reveals to us a sin that is permanent and leads us to destruction. It is embedded in our hearts and most often portrayed as righteousness, justice and fairness. It is called envy. Envy is the sin of fallen angels. Envy has led Satan to say that he is better than God. It was envy that built Adam's pride to disobey God and turned this world into a fallen world as we hear in the first reading. Envy made Cain murder his brother Abel and this was the first human blood soaked the earth. Envy divides the earth, encourages pride and even destroys community and defiles grace.

The early chapters of the Book of Genesis have much to teach us about why things are as they are today. Today's first reading tells us of the goings on immediately after Eve, then Adam, ate of the forbidden tree. Is this a true account, exact in every detail? We don't know as there were no witnesses there taking notes. What we do know is that all mankind is descended from Adam and Eve and that we all bear the stain of their first (the original) sin. The man is not referred to as "Adam" until after this reading. He is known now simply as "the man." The name "Adam" comes from his origins: Genesis 2:7 says that God formed him from the dust of the ground – *adamah* in Hebrew.

Envy can be found everywhere, in each and every family, in each and every community, and in each and every society. Envy feeds the hunger of the beast, fueling the desire to have more; more than others; filling our desire to be better, better than others. Pride is not the desire of having something but having more of it than the next person. It is this comparison that makes us proud, a feeling of pleasure of being above the rest. Once the element of comparison is gone, so too is pride.

People fight over so many things, tenure, parking, – each one suggesting that he is better than the other. I have met teachers who say that they are better than the one given a Recognition Award. It's only that they say they have higher standards that they would not do what the other teacher did in relating to his students and the school families. Yes, envy is spiteful, begrudging and seeks to destroy the other. This is what happened to Jesus when he came home to Nazareth. His own townsfolk said of him: "He is out of his mind," while the Pharisees said, "He is possessed and by the Prince of demons, he drives out demons." It happened also to St. Paul in the second reading. His second letter to the Corinthians was written in response to those whom he called false apostles who twisted what St. Paul said in his first letter, accusing Paul of being all talk, irresponsible and ambitious and thus prompting him to write his second letter starting with the words: "Brothers and sisters: Since we have the same spirit of faith according to what is written, I believed, therefore, I spoke, we too believe and therefore we speak." This letter was written in preparation for his visit that would come after his visit to Macedonia.

Envy delights in the misfortune of anyone who is better than we are, has a better job or a bigger house. If something happens in their life, we quietly rejoice at their misfortune. This is rarely acknowledged as part of our nature, but it is there. Jesus exposes it for what it is. He says, "If a kingdom is divided against itself, that kingdom cannot stand. And if a house is divided against itself, that house will not stand." This is an unforgivable act as Jesus tells us in the Gospel reading, a "blasphemy against the Holy Spirit." For they had said, "He (Jesus) has an unclean spirit."

So, to do better, let's begin by checking the envy thermometer. Beginning with an awareness to the call to be compassionate must always be our first step. If I see someone suffering, I feel contrition for myself and acknowledge the painful emotion that I have seen. Acknowledge one's desire for the joy of the Holy Spirit. As our self-judgment subsides, try rejoicing in the Holy Spirit, feeling happy for the other person, projecting images of joy in their experiences. If you rejoice in their joy, you will also find joy in yourself. So, may the Lord grant you the joy and the peace that you seek.

The Call

Recently, we have established in Our Lady of Lourdes Parish a new Ministry: the Ministry for vocations. Vocation comes from the Latin word ‘vocare’ which means ‘to call’.

Everyone has a calling, a call from God that happens in the different stages of one’s life. That ‘call’ needs a response from us, whether it’s the call to the priesthood, the religious life, to a life of consecrated celibacy, to marriage, to whatever profession we are called to in life or to lay ministry.

While the call to the priesthood, religious life or consecrated celibate life and marriage are lifetime callings, the call to lay ministry is not. **The Lay Ministry is a response to the call to serve God in a particular ministry at a certain time of one’s life.** Not all persons in the parish are called at the same time in the same way for a certain ministry. With the responsibilities one has for family, work and other obligations, those who are ready to serve and to grow by serving are called. Responsibilities for family and other obligations should always be respected. The commitment to serve should not however be at the expense of the ministry. A lay minister who is incapacitated or who cannot function well in his/her ministry (e.g. by reason of age or sickness) should humbly and graciously give way to others who can serve in the same ministry. If a lay minister has two functions as for instance being lector and extraordinary minister for Holy Communion, he or she should not appropriate both to himself except on extraordinary cases where we lack lay ministers in either of them. And it is important also to say that ideally a lay minister should be a part of the regular liturgical celebration of the day in the week where he or she is serving.

Liturgical Ministers serve the parish in a visible manner. With sincere understanding that no one is without fault and that Jesus promised to forgive all those who ask for his forgiveness, certain situations preclude some from serving in certain liturgical ministries in our parish. For example, a person living in a marriage relationship that is not recognized by the Church cannot serve as a Lay Eucharistic Minister or a Minister for the Sick or Lector or Altar Server or Sacristan. If a lay minister finds himself/herself in this situation, speak to the pastor or his delegate immediately. This is not to pass judgment on anyone; however, it is pastorally important to avoid SCANDAL by ensuring that, where possible, lay people in any particular ministry are in full communion with the Church in everything.

We are a Church of Collaboration and Participation. This idea of the Church comes from the Second Vatican Council that speaks of the Church as a People of God, Body of Christ, Temple of the Holy Spirit, a Pilgrim Church, and the Church as sacrament of intimate union with God and the unity of all mankind. (Lumen Gentium 1)

We take our lesson from St. Paul’s letter to the Corinthians (12:14-19). ‘‘For the body does not consist of one member but of many. If the foot should say, ‘‘Because I am not a hand, I do not belong to the body,’’ that would not make it any less a part of the body. And if the ear should say, ‘‘Because I am not an eye, I do not belong to the body,’’ that would not make it any less a part of the body. If the whole body were an eye, where would be the sense of hearing? If the whole body were an ear, where would be the sense of smell? But as it is, God arranged the members in the body, each one of them, as he chose. If all were a single member, where would the body be? As it is, there are many parts, yet one body.’’

While our hearts are filled with gratitude to all those who serve in the Ministries of Worship, Formation/Education and Service, let each one in OLL respond to the call to Lay Ministry that gives him/her joy, fulfillment and meaning in life.

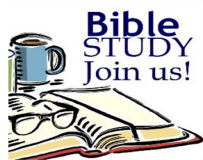

WHEN IRISH EYES ARE WEEPING

On May 25th, Ireland’s voters approved repeal of its country’s 8th Amendment of the Irish constitution that outlawed abortions. The 8th Amendment had granted the unborn fetus and the pregnant woman an equal right to life. The words, “Provision may be made by law for the regulation of termination of pregnancies,” replaces the pro-life provision.

After the referendum, Bishop Kevin Doran of Elphin advised abortion supporters to seek forgiveness in confession. He said: “Ultimately all sin, and sin is not just related to this area, but all sin is about decisions that impact on our relationship with God.”

Abortion is an issue of great moral gravity. The Catholic Church teaches: “Since the first century the Church has affirmed the moral evil of every procured abortion. This teaching has not changed and remains unchangeable. Direct abortion, that is to say, abortion willed either as an end or a means, is gravely contrary to the moral law.” (*Catechism of the Catholic Church*, 2271)

Supporters have called abortion everything from inconvenient and unwanted to rights-denying and life-threatening. But the words of Thomas Aquinas ring true here: “How foolish it is to sacrifice the greatest and eternal goods for trifling, temporal goods is clear to everyone but a fool or an infidel (On Kingship, Ch. X.)” Yes, even “life threatening” is minor compared to the loss of eternal happiness with God.

Pray for Ireland. Pray to the Blessed Virgin for an end to abortions. Look into our parish Respect Life Ministry and support its efforts.

Abortions worldwide this year (Jan 1 through June 5, 2018): 17,882,344

(Worldometer.com, based on World Health Organization) This amounts to the population of four cities the size of Los Angeles.
