National Catholic Schools Sunday

Third Sunday In Ordinary Time

First Reading: Nehemiah 8:2-4a, 5-6, 8-10
Second Reading: 1 Corinthians 12:12-14, 27
Gospel: Luke 1:1-4, 14-21

Fifty years after the death and resurrection of Jesus, His message had swept throughout the Roman Empire. Christian communities had spread widely and Luke saw it as an appropriate time to put into writing what Jesus had said and done according to the testimonies of eye witnesses who turned into “Ministers of the Word”, not masters, but “Servants of the Word.” We find these at the beginning of today’s gospel reading .

Luke wants to prepare solid foundations for our Christian faith. The Gospel opens describing the beginnings of Jesus’ public life as He dramatically presents His mission during a Sabbath gathering in the synagogue of Nazareth: “The spirit of the Lord is upon me because he has anointed me to bring glad tidings to the poor. He has sent me to proclaim liberty to captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free and proclaim a year of favor with the Lord.”

This passage from the Book of Isaiah is a perfect inaugural speech. Jesus then continues by declaring that the moment of salvation has arrived and that the long-awaited Messiah, who is the fulfillment of Israel’s longings and dreams, has come. He says, “Today, this scripture is being fulfilled in your hearing.”

Each of us should have a personal mission statement based on that of Jesus. God calls us by virtue of our own Baptism to proclaim the Good News of the Gospel to all people, starting with our families. We teach our children when they are very young how to make the sign of the cross, to bless themselves with holy water, to say their prayers before bedtime. We preach a silent homily to our neighbors and friends when we do the right thing at difficult times. We heal others when we give an assuring touch or offer forgiveness for the everyday hurts that family life brings.

National Catholic Schools Week begins today. This year’s theme is “Catholic Schools: Learn. Serve. Lead. Succeed.” We have our own parochial school, an institution not just of learning but of evangelization. Our Lady of Lourdes School has raised its standards because we seek excellence, not just in academics, but in spiritual and social areas as well. The standard of excellence we strive for is not just found in this year’s theme for National Catholic Schools Week but is expressed best in Our Lady of Lourdes School mission

statement: To learn, to live, to love as faith-filled, educated, service-oriented individuals who respect the rights and needs of others. The mission statement of Our Lady of Lourdes School states:

“With Christ as our foundation, love, charity, and character are woven into classroom instruction and school activities. Our Lady of Lourdes School recognizes parents as the primary educators working in positive partnership with parish and school to create a faith community that inspires its members to live as Jesus lived. In the name of Jesus Christ, we unite with one another in the single purpose of influencing the educational and spiritual journey of each student as trustworthy, respectful, responsible, fair, and caring citizens. It is the expectation that Our Lady of Lourdes students emerge with the ability and desire to think critically, live the Gospel message, reach out to others in service, further social justice and use their knowledge and gifts to contribute to the world and deepen their relationship with God.”

Our education does not stop with academic achievement but continues with the physical, social and spiritual development of the child. Love, charity and character are woven into classroom instruction and school activities. Each school day, the Catholic faith is taught in age-appropriate ways to give a strong moral underpinning to each child’s personal development.

At the beginning of National Catholic School’s Week, let us pray for the teachers who offer daily their gifts of knowledge and love, skillfully bringing out the potential of each child; for the many staff, parents and volunteers in our school who fill in when they are needed; and for our benefactors, whose financial gifts make possible a Catholic education for families who otherwise could not afford it. As this week is all about our Catholic Schools, let us not forget our teachers and volunteers in our Sunday school for our children and those in our Religious Education program.

Let us all take the reins of maintaining and strengthening our Catholic School and Religious Education Programs as a witness to the mission of Jesus who came to set captives free from their ignorance and make each year a year of favor for the Lord.



Cast into the Deep

OLL Church: The attraction at the Street Corner

Street Corners are dangerous places. On such a corner, one can get run over or simply overlooked. Many a time, at night, do I hear screeching tires and cries for help due to people driving recklessly and not stopping at the street corners of Apperson Street and Tujunga Canyon Blvd. And drivers love to do “donuts” on that corner or race up and down the streets without stopping at the corner’s stop signs. Also, in the daytime, while people try to cross the street, some cars go around them without giving way to these pedestrians. Fortunately, no lives have been lost but shall we wait for something to happen aside from broken limbs?

Furthermore, big rigs and RVs line up Apperson Street and Tujunga Canyon Blvd. Although the Neighborhood Council has been alerted and is doing its job, these big rigs and RVs have not stopped parking their vehicles near this street corner. They have become a danger not just to our students in school or to churchgoers but to anyone who walks his or her dog along this street corner.

In spite of this, the corner of Apperson Street and Tujunga Canyon Blvd is a unique and special corner. The Parish Church of Our Lady of Lourdes graces this corner and has become more visible after the trees were thinned and trimmed. Although the tower along this street corner is still in need of repair, the uniquely beautiful Church of Our Lady of Lourdes sheds its beauty on this street corner. It is in this church by this corner that people come to worship, where priests celebrate with the people the Sacred Eucharist and where many hearts, souls and minds have found their transformation. It is and has become the Mount Tabor of our Christian faith by the foothills of Tujunga-Sunland. It is here where we pray together, celebrate our joys and pains, get our children baptized and married and send off our departed loved ones with our prayers at their funerals. It is here where we pray for guidance, where our reflections reach unparalleled depth. It is here where people who seem to lose their sense of identity come to discover themselves once again especially in the Sacrament of Reconciliation. And in the hidden search

of our innermost being, it is here where we find Jesus and His Mother, Mary, enshrined in Our Lady of Lourdes and in Our Lady of Guadalupe.

After the first mass on October 17, 1920 in the home of Mrs. Elizabeth Forster at 10342 Mountain Avenue celebrated by Fr. Joseph Tonello, the present Church and rectory were built and completed in 1969 under the able leadership of Msgr. Edward Wade. In between those years were interesting stories of how this gentle area by the street corner was turned not just into a center of worship but of Catholic Education. The dedication Holy Mass celebrated by Cardinal Timothy Manning on May 3, 1970 celebrated 50 golden years of the Catholic Community in Tujunga-Sunland.

Today, Our Lady of Lourdes Church remains a street corner of sacred space. Many stories are taking place by this street corner. Every first and third Saturdays, people flock to the Pasture for free bread and produce. Saturdays are filled with the celebrations of Baptisms, Weddings, Quinceañeras and funerals aside from confessions and the Vigil Mass of Sunday. And amongst them are people who come to pray at the grottos of Our Lady of Lourdes and Our Lady of Guadalupe even late into the night. Whether intended or by chance, whether out of curiosity or simple drifting by, or not knowing where to go, people who come to this church by the street corner discover something or someone within. Thus, I have met many first timers who, having just dropped by, say “this is our home”.

I believe, however, that there are just two reasons why this church by the street corner has a powerful attraction and a silent inspiration. First, is the Blessed Mother who watches over this street corner. Through the noise of sometimes rampaging street cars and the stillness of the evening, through stormy or sunny weather, she hovers with her mantle of maternal love and care. The second is the hospitality of those who welcome everyone into this Church by the street corner.

Be careful when you pass by the Church on this street corner. It is here where you will discover that Jesus is looking for you.

God and Person

The Catholic belief in the trinity is summarized in the phrase: “Three persons in one God.” In what way can we refer to the Father, Son, or Holy Spirit as a “person”? When we talk of God’s “transcendence” we mean that He is not open to our full understanding. This leaves us two avenues to approximate in what sense He is called a “person.” The first is Aquinas’ way of negation: we cannot know what God is, but we can know what He is not. The second is Aquinas’ way of analogy: God made man in His image, and we can reach some understanding of Him through an analogy with man. We will take the second path.

The Latin term “*persona*” is etymologically linked to the ancient Greek “*πρόσωπον*,” that denoted a blind or mask worn by actors. It shows its influence today when we call a person “two-faced,” or ask what face he is showing, or talk about one’s personality. The mask, or “*persona*,” reveals the person portrayed by the actor.

Boethius, in his *De Persona et Duabus Naturis*, gave the classical definition of “person” as “an individual substance of a rational nature.” As “individual substance,” Boethius excluded accidents, for example coloring, clothing, weight, or height. If we deduct such things from the individual, the substance remains. The particular kind of substance identified by Boethius was that substance “of a rational nature.” He would predicate “person” only to intellectual beings.

Thomas Aquinas found fault with Boethius’ definition. It allowed for the human nature of Christ and the rational soul of man separated from the body to fall under the definition of person. Aquinas believed that the individual substance subsisted in itself, complete and separated from others. The human nature of Christ does not subsist independent of His divine nature; they are one. Likewise, the rational soul and the body are one as we believe when we profess “the resurrection of the body.” The soul, though the form of the body, is not complete without the body. The spiritual nature of the human soul is, however, an integral part of the personhood of man.

So far, we have defined a person as an individual substance with a rational nature, complete, subsistent by itself, and separated from others. The rational soul, unlike material substance, has the ability to subsist by itself, yet incomplete without the body. While the material substance can be destroyed by an

external cause, the rational soul cannot. This gives human souls a more perfect manner of existing than material souls and puts them closer to the level of other spiritual substances, like angels.


We know from this that the spiritual nature of the human person is free from the mundane limitations of irrational beings. Our lives began in time, but we will outlive time. We can pursue abstract and universal knowledge—philosophy, theology, ethics, music, and mathematics—that transcends sense data. We possess free will and are able to control our emotions and instinctual responses, making us responsible for our actions. Aquinas calls this last aspect a special dignity that demands of a person the recognition of this dignity in the person of others. Along with this comes the relatedness of persons through self-consciousness and self-giving. This is a mirror of the relatedness and communication among the persons of the trinitarian mystery, a mystery that stands at the core of personality. Richard of Saint-Victor (d. 1173) described this through the analogy of the Lover, the Loved, and the Love as Initial Gift.

We speak of our personhood as an analog to the personhood of God; but we cannot carry the analogy too far. Imbedded in our spiritual nature is a transcendental aspect that directs us in our contemplations to the mystery of God. We use our rational gifts to build our knowledge of God upon what we know of the world, but this always points us toward a transcendental knowledge that we cannot fully grasp within our rational faculties. Nevertheless, our duty is to continue seeking further into the mystery. In his book *Foundations of Christian Faith*, theologian Karl Rahner gives a nice metaphor describing our condition:

“In the ultimate depths of his being, man knows nothing more surely than that his knowledge, that is, what is called knowledge in everyday parlance, is only a small island in a vast sea that has not been traveled. It is a floating island, and it might be more familiar to us than the sea, but ultimately it is borne by the sea and only because it is can we be borne by it. Hence the existentiell (sic) question for the knower is this: Which does he love more, the small island of his so-called knowledge or the sea of infinite mystery? Is the little light with which he illuminates this island—we call it science and scholarship—to be an eternal light which will shine forever for him? That would surely be hell.”
